Dear Parents.

The midway mark of the 2022 school year is nearly upon us and as such, mid-year Student Reports will be distributed tomorrow.

A–E grades or word equivalents are used across Australia, to describe a range of student achievement from minimal to excellent against the Australian Curriculum achievement standards.

One of the challenges around the current A-E grading is that many parents of primary school age children often have a recollection of their school days whereby the "C" was not a grade to celebrate. However, by today's standards, a student with a column full of C (Satisfactory) grades can indeed be very well "satisfied".

As you read your child's report next week, please remember that:

An 'A' grade indicates that the student has shown a thorough knowledge and understanding of a topic and <u>can apply that</u> information in unfamiliar situations.

Typically a 'C' grade means a student is achieving what is expected of them at that point in their learning. This is a <u>considerable achievement because of the high expectations built in to the Curriculum achievement standards</u>. So, please celebrate the Cs!

An 'E' grade means the student is just beginning to work towards the achievement standard.

Α	Excellent achievement of what is expected at this year level
В	Good achievement of what is expected at this year level
С	Satisfactory achievement of what is expected at this year level
D	Partial achievement of what is expected at this year level
Е	Minimal achievement of what is expected at this year level

If you would like to discuss this further, with particular reference to your child's report, an opportunity to meet with your child's class teacher will again be offered in Term 3.

All the best for a safe and happy school holiday period, I hope the break to school routine will provide an opportunity for our students and staff to overcome the winter illnesses that have become so prevalent during the past few weeks.

Group members are aged between six and thirty-one years.


As a group, through song and dance in a contemporary setting, they pass on stories to the wider community of Aboriginal culture.


# **DEFENCE NEWS**

'Support the Troops' is run twice a year, where Australia Post delivers care packages sent by the public. We thought it would be a great way to show our appreciation leading up to Christmas, knowing members of the ADF would be away from their families. We sent them in October, not knowing where they were going or who would receive them.

At the end of last month we received a reply! Our letters & cards ended up on HMAS Adelaide, off the Coast of Nuku Alofa Island, in Tonga. Able Seaman, Jacquie Day, wrote to us and answered some of the questions that the students had asked. HMAS Adelaide helped the residents of Tonga after a volcanic eruption and Tsunami. They also helped the community to rebuild and bring them essential supplies.

Thank you guys so, so much for your kind letters. We have hung them around our ship, HMAS Adelaide, for all the crew to enjoy! My name is Able Seaman Jacquie Day and I work in the Ships Office on board HMAS Adelaide. One of our many core roles is taking mail sent to us by all you beautiful people and distributing them to the members.

To answer your questions:

Where do you sleep? Our Mess' (slang for our accommodation) can have anywhere between 18-36 people and the layout is bunk beds stacked three high! Don't worry, we have safety rails to stop us rolling out of bed when the seas get rough.

Do you get any down time? Each job role on the ship has different timings to come to work. Some have to take watches which involves being up all hours of the night. Where I work I do 7:30am to 4pm each day, this is similar for many other jobs on board too. How long are you away for? We have no end date at the moment but we departed Brisbane on 20 Jan 22 and due back around mid March 22.

Is it hot or cold where you are and can you tell us where you are? It is very hot. We are currently off the coast of Nuku Alofa Island in Tonga helping them after the volcano eruption and Tsunami damage and assisting rebuild their community while also bringing them essential supplies along with other allied countries.

We are so sorry it took so long for your messages to get to us but we are so thankful you took the time. Love from.
